Help us kick off our 2007-2008 season by joining Mr. Vince DiPofi, P.E. as he presents an overall summary of biodiesel and its current role in the biofuels industry. Some of the issues to be covered: energy efficiency of producing biodiesel, feedstock considerations, cost to manufacture and environmental impact as well as Project execution strategies and how they differ from traditional industrial type engineering projects. There will be some additional discussion on Ethanol v. Biodiesel; what are the comparative advantages of each and what role will Biodiesel play in the current energy challenges faced by the U.S.

Vince DiPofi, P.E. currently serves as the Sr. Vice President of Biofuels at SSOE, a full-service A/E firm with nineteen locations throughout the United States and China.

**A message from TST Program Chair, Lionel Sully, Ph.D**

As noted on page 1 by TST President Bill Hupp, the theme for the TST 2007-2008 luncheon series is "Energy and Economic Development". This choice came from discussions at our annual planning meeting last June. I would like to thank Bill Thomas, Robert Ruse, Tom Uhler and Bob Harold for their assistance in identifying our speakers.

The topic of energy is an almost daily presence in the media and in governmental debate these days. The cost of fuel for our vehicles is the most visible topic. Will market forces, or government regulation and subsidies, drive technology for more fuel efficient vehicles and alternative fuels? Vince DiPofi from SSOE will review the bio-diesel contribution to this debate in September. How will the nation balance the drive for growth of alternative fuels, of wind, nuclear and solar energies? As part of this discussion, Ohio's substantial economic initiatives in the fuel cell industry will be reviewed by Ken Alfred in December.

The environmental movement, going green, is essentially a debate about energy as the generation and the consumption of energy and energy-derived products are the underlying factors in the generation of greenhouse gases. One of the major consumers of energy are the buildings we live and work in. The Toledo area is well placed, with its strength in the architectural and engineering professions, to address this issue. Mary Driscoll will provide an overview in October of the US Green Building Council's LEED Rating System and how our local Northwest Ohio Green Building Council Branch is helping transform the built environment. This will be followed by a presentation of the Chevron energy study for Lucas County by Earl Reid in November.

Energy affects the cost of almost everything we buy, and given the consumer drives about 2/3 of the USA economic output, the behavior of us as individuals will have a major impact on the health of 2008. We are pleased to welcome Matt Faltys back for his annual economic update in January. The current market volatility, combined with a rising price of energy will, I am sure, provide Matt with plenty of fodder for his penetrating, but witty analysis.

A key advantage of the Toledo area is its place as a transportation hub. Efficient logistics require seamless transfer between modes of transportation and thus will minimize energy use. In March Tom Blaha will give us his perspectives on the logistical opportunities in the greater Toledo area. New technology will certainly provide the means to address the future energy needs of the nation. Bob Kozar will review the substantial energy-related research effort underway at the University of Toledo - this will be in February. In a similar vein, but at the implementation stage, Aaron Coulter and Bob Flage will discuss at the April lunch meeting the integrated effort between Sunoco and BOC to generate and distribute hydrogen.

We trust that these presentations will provide our members a thought-provoking review of key energy issues of the community, the state and the country. The continued health of our economy, and therefore our corporate and personal lives, is dependant on success in the resolution of the energy issues we face.

Mr. DiPofi is a member of the National Society of Engineers and has been a registered Professional Engineer in Ohio and Michigan since 1990. He received his Bachelor of Science from The University of Toledo in Mechanical Engineering in 1985. Mr. DiPofi was named Young Engineer of the Year in 1991 by the Toledo Society of Professional Engineers. Mr. DiPofi has been in the A/E consulting industry since 1981 serving previously as engineer, project manager, and business manager. His clients, among others, include Go Ethanol, Freedom Fuels, ConAgra Foods, and Procter & Gamble.

Mr. DiPofi has led SSOE's entry into the emerging biofuels market. SSOE currently has numerous ethanol and biodiesel projects underway in 4 states. In addition, SSOE was recently awarded a patent for an innovative new process that reduces the energy and cost of producing biodiesel. Mr. DiPofi and his team are also working with The University of Toledo, and several area groups to lead the way in making Toledo a nationwide center for biofuels production and distribution.
